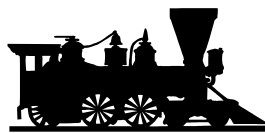


Train Tracks

Hot Summer Days, Cool History!

On Sunday, June 10th, the Easton Historical Society will celebrate our museum and headquarters with a display about trains! We have some special things planned for you to see and do.

First, meet a hobo, one of those decidedly different individuals who were once the “kings of the rails.” Find out about hobo signs, and what some of them mean. Kids, dress in your best hobo outfit and take part in our hobo contest at 3 P.M. Next, spend a few minutes between trains with the station master. Learn about the very first train that arrived in Easton, and why it didn’t leave as quickly as it came. Find out about switching tracks, and what happens when things don’t go as well as planned. View our display of early photos of locomotives and train stations around Easton. Get a copy of an original train ticket and a reproduction railroad stock certificate.

The highlight of the day will be an unbelievable model train set of the Ames Shovel complex, built to exact scale by Ellery Willis over twenty years ago. You have to see this to believe it! Mr. Willis painstakingly measured all the buildings in the complex, and created a very accurate representation of the former shovel company. Soon this model will be returned for restoration and display in a model railroad museum. Don’t pass up an opportunity to view this great historical item!

The July open house will feature items used to advertise some of our local businesses, especially those that were commonly given away to customers. This display was put together a few months ago, but very poor weather kept most people away. Check out this great bunch of things, from 1870’s advertising cards to ashtrays and yardsticks. You might be surprised at what you remember!

For August, watch the web site and local papers for open house announcements. Don’t forget to reserve your space for our yard sale on September 8th! This is a good time to rid yourself of that “stuff” that keeps collecting around the house or garage. Details are inside this issue. As the young people say, have a chillin’ summer!

The Society has had a busy Spring, with several member events. My thanks to everybody that participated in any events. Some special thanks worth mentioning:

- In March we held our eighth annual Chowder and Chatter at the Southeastern Regional Vocational School. This event is one of our most popular, selling out in just a few days. Guest speakers Alice McCarthy, John Grant, Lynn White, and Ginny Reusch each spoke about early conservation efforts in Easton, including the history of Wheaton Farm and the formation of the NRT. The students at Southeastern did a great job cooking and serving our meal. This event has been underwritten by Avery and Kevin Williams since it's inception. Special thanks to them for their continued support.
- Professor Chet Raymo led another one of his great mystery walks on the Stonehill College campus. The event was well attended, and participants learned about rock formations and their movement over time. Chet is always informative and the walk through Stonehill's beautiful campus is always a delight.
- At our Spring Meeting Greg Galer, Curator, and Nicole Tourangeau, Archivist, of the Stonehill Industrial History Center gave an interesting lecture to members about buildings and artifacts from Easton's history and then led a tour of the collections.
- The Annual Meeting in May was held in the library of the Borderland Mansion before a backdrop of rare books. Special thanks to Eleanor Yahrmarkt for coordinating this special venue. Ken Gloss, owner of Boston's Brattle Book Store, attended the event and talked about old and rare books. Ken was nice enough to give free verbal appraisals to those that brought books to the event.
- We recently held a dedication of the Ladies Parlor at the Railroad Station in honor of Margaret Adams Williams. The dedication recognized Ms. Williams' long-time support of our organization. Many remember her as "the cake lady," because of her tradition of arriving at our Open House events with a treat in hand.
- Ken Martin again led his semi-annual bottle drive at the Railroad Station. Proceeds of \$113 from this drive directly benefit the upkeep of our historic building. Our thanks to Ken and Ed Hands for their efforts.
- The Society's Research Group meets weekly during Spring and Fall to organize and categorize the collections of the Museum. This work makes it easier for researchers to find information quickly. The group's dedicated members include Judy Luke, Hazel Varella, Barbara Beech, and Maureen Raymo.
- Curator Frank Meninno has really brought a lot of creativity to our monthly Open House events. Recent exhibits include a history of the DeWitt Lumber Company and artifacts detailing Easton business' advertising & giveaways. Thanks go to Dwight MacKerron, who spoke at our March Open House about the culture of the Samuel Hodges Tavern Store. Continued thanks to Frank for his leadership and dedication. Thanks also go to Frank's wife, Anne-Marie, and sons, Dominic and Anthony, who do a lot to get the Station ready for the public.

Curator's Corner

Sometimes I can't read my own writing. A case in point is last quarters newsletter, where I misspelled the name of Persis Garniss, who graciously donated ice tongs and an ice pike to the Society. My sincere apologies for the error in spelling, and many thanks for her equally gracious understanding!

Last month, I attended a seminar offered to small museums and historical societies. It was hosted by the Centerville Historical Society, where I spent some time viewing a wonderful collection of Victorian era dresses, wonderfully displayed on mannequins. When I asked their curator how he was able to get some mannequins, he said "just keep asking the stores until you get some." Being one to know good advice when it is offered, I made the rounds at the local shopping centers. After about three weeks, JC Penney called from their Taunton, MA. Store and offered to donate some half height forms typically used to display shirts or blouses. Thanks to their generosity, we are now able to properly display some of the clothing items in our collections. Right now, there is on display a coat worn as part of the uniform of the original Oliver Ames High School band. The coat dates from about 1900—1910, and an accompanying photo shows the uniforms worn by band members during this time. I still hope to secure one or two full male and female mannequins to display dresses or full uniforms.

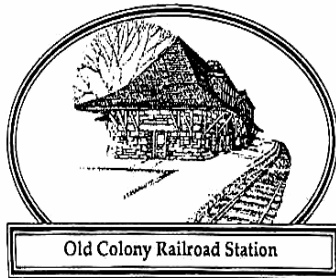
